## September in the Garden By: Bob Knerr

Keep to your routine!! Remember your calendar and record what you do and when you do it. Good rose growing requires only a few jobs but they must be done consistently and on time.

Feed monthly and water weekly if there has not been 2" of rain from the sky.

Plants will need 5-gallons of water weekly if no rain. This should be divided into two waterings per week. This is by far the most important need for your roses. DO NOT NEGLECT THIS JOB!!

**1.** Spray for fungus (blackspot) every 7-10 days even if the thermometer is supposed to reach 90 degrees. Use a contact fungicide like Mancozeb and a systemic fungicide like honor guard.

2. Keep weeds out of the rose beds. They harbor insects and use up nutrients the roses need.

3. Keep the roses pruned to a reasonable height as you cut old blooms. You can cut down farther than the first 5 leaf bud union to keep them in check.

4. If you have questions about your roses or are having difficulty with some disease or insect damage, bring a specimen to the rose meeting and maybe someone can identify the trouble and suggest a remedy for the problem.

5. Mites could be a problem in the dry hot weather. They are tiny insects seen on the undersides of the leaves. If you are old like me you may need a magnifying glass to see them. They suck the nutrients out of the leaves and leave the leaves looking anemic and light pale green. They can be controlled by washing the undersides of the leaves with a water wand two to three times a week. If that does not do it, you can spray with Avid miticide weekly. Forbid will also work.

Cut and enjoy your roses and share them with neighbors.

#### Rose Show Prep

Assumption is that you have been doing all the necessary tasks throughout the year so far. Feeding, watering, and spraying. Each on a regular basis.

We start with the fact that roses tend to recycle their blooms every 42 days. Some will be 38 days and some will be 45 days depending on the variety. Know your rose. Sprays will take 4-5 days longer than individual blooms

Next is the fact that this schedule will be influenced by the weather of which you have no control. A hot September will shorten the time and a cool wet cloudy September will lengthen it. 7

Our date for the exhibition this year is October X. So with the hope of having a good bloom for the exhibit, count back 42 days (6 weeks) and make a cut on a good cane at least pencil size just above a 5 leaf. Do not cut back more than 25% of the bush. This cutback is NOT like the one you did in February.

If you have a bush with 4 good canes, to enhance the chance of having a good bloom, cut one cane back at 38 days, one at 40 days, one at 42 days and one at 44 days. This will help to counteract the influence of the weather.

As the new cane develops, if you are hoping for a large hybrid type bloom, disbud all side buds that arise and leave only one good central bloom. If you are looking for a spray to develop disbud the central bloom and let all the side blooms develop.

Immediately after cutback give the bush a dose of a fast acting fertilizer (liquid or 10-10-10) just like you did in the spring. This tells it to start growing again.

Two week later (one month before exhibit) give a dose of liquid fertilizer(peters, miracle gro, mills easy feed). Two week later (2 weeks before exhibit) give another dose of liquid. One week before the exhibit you may want to give the bush a dose of 0-10-10. That adds potassium and phosphorus for enhanced color.

If your great bloom looks like it will open two days before the time, cut it and refrigerate it at about 34-35 degrees in the fridg.

Cut the stem at least 18" long and do NOT remove the leaves. They are an important part of the rose

#### Prep at the exhibition

Prep tools: vase, tweezers, brushes, scissors, deckle scissors, wedging material (styrofoam, saran wrap, aluminum foil) pen cotton balls or cue tips, tissues, exacto blade, pruner, 3x5 note cards.

Get to the Arboretum EARLY. If you arrive with 3-4 roses 10 minutes before entries close you will not be able to get them in and no one will be able to help you!!!!

We will try to show how to prep a bloom at the meeting.
