# WCFRS PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Welcome to October! I hope you are beginning to have some wonderful October blossoms! It has been very dry so do not forget to water your roses. Please remember to stop fertilizing your roses by the end of October.

The dates of WCFRS meetings for the rest of the year are: 10/11/25, 11/8/25, 12/13/25. You can access all the information about the WCFRS calendar by going to our website. Please refer others to our website for information about how to grow roses.

The dates for the 2026 WCFRS meetings are as follows:

1/10/26, 2/14/26, 3/14/26, 4/18/26 (1 week later than usual due to Azalea Festival the week before), 5/2/26 (Rose Tour), 6/13/26, 8/8/26, 9/12/26, 10/10/26, 11/14/26, 12/12/26.

The 2026 WCFRS meeting schedule with all topics/ speakers will be updated on the WCFRS website soon.

We had a good Zoom meeting in September with our speaker, Satish Prabhu. His rose garden is certainly amazing and it is unbelievable that he continues to take care of his large rose garden by himself! We enjoyed hearing his perspective on growing roses and seeing the pictures of his lovely roses.

On October 11 we will have our annual WCFRS Exhibition. You will enjoy participating with the exhibition and and you will learn by participating and seeing others' roses. The doors will open at 8:00 am so you can prep your roses for the exhibition. The judging will start at 10:00 AM sharp. You must have your roses/ photos in place on the tables labeled and ready. Please remember you need to come early to be ready. WCFRS does own some vases you may use but please bring your own vases to make sure we have enough.

#### There are 13 classes for rose blossoms:

- 1. Hybrid Tea and Grandiflora one bloom per stem, no side buds
- 2. Hybrid Tea fully open, stamens showing
- 3. Floribunda one bloom per stem or spray of 2 or more open blooms
- 4. Fragrance any rose
- 5. Shrub (includes David Austins)
- 6. Climber
- 7. Mini or Miniflora 1 bloom per stem. no side buds
- 8. Mini or Miniflora spray
- 9. Old Garden Rose
- 10. Any Other Rose
- 11. Hybrid Tea or Floribunda Floating in a Bowl no foliage
- 12. Mini or Miniflora Floating in a Bowl no foliage
- 13. Rose Bouquet 5 or more roses same or mixed in a vase

Please remember that every exhibit should have a 3" x 5" index card with the name and type of rose on the front of the card and your name on the back of the card. You will place the card on the table in front of your rose.

There are also 3 classes for photos.

Please remember the photo should be 4" x 6" and have your name on the back of the photo.

- 1. Photography: any rose at it's best form and beauty
- 2. Photography: any rose society activity
- 3. Photography: impressionistic photo imaging a rose in a different way

## October in the Garden By: Bob Knerr

What more is there to say?!! I say the same things each month, but that is what rose care is all about. Keep to your routine!! Remember your calendar and record what you do and when you do it. Good rose growing requires only a few jobs but they must be done consistently and on time.

Feed monthly – Use a liquid fertilizer now. An organic will take too long to break down and will not be useful before the frosts begin. Stop fertilizing by the end of October.

Water weekly if there has not been 2" of rain from the sky. Plants will need 5-6 gallons of water weekly if no rain. This should be divided into two waterings per week. This is by far the most important need for your roses. DO NOT NEGLECT THIS JOB!!

- 1. Spray for fungus (blackspot) every 7-10 days. Use a contact fungicide like Mancozeb and a systemic fungicide like honor guard.
- 2. Keep weeds out of the rose beds. They harbor insects and use up nutrients the roses need.
- 3. Keep the roses pruned to a reasonable height as you cut old blooms. You can cut down farther than the first 5 leaf bud union to keep them in check.
- 4. If you have questions about your roses or are having some difficulty with some disease or insect damage, bring a specimen to the rose meeting and maybe someone can identify the trouble and suggest a remedy for the problem.
- 5. Mites could be a problem in the dry hot weather. They are tiny insects seen on the undersides of the leaves. If you are old like me, you may need a magnifying glass to see them. They suck the nutrients out of the leaves and leave the foliage looking anemic and light pale green. They can be controlled by washing the undersides of the leaves with a water wand two to three times a week. If that does not do it, you can spray with Avid miticide weekly. Forbid will work also.
- 6. You may want to refresh your mulch if most of the mulch you applied in the spring has turned to soil. This will protect the roots of the plants during the cool winter months.

Cut and enjoy your roses and share them with neighbors.
